FROM YOUR PASTOR

Monte Pascoe was Executive Director of the Colorado Department of Natural Resources during part of my time as Assistant Director. He was a Wonderful Man!

We were working on the Energy Boom in Colorado in 1981 which became the Energy Bust in 1982. As we looked to stabilize 104 local governments in Western Colorado, he told me, "I am more impressed with small successes than big plans."

Those are words that I have carried with me not only throughout my Professional Career, but also into my Priesthood.

As we approach the midpoint of COVID Lent 2021, perhaps it is important to look at our Small Successes in the light of our Big Plans of Ash Wednesday.

Equally important, how do we take our Time, Talent, and Treasure and transfer them into the Prayer, Fasting, and Alms Giving of Lent?

And finally, how does what we do during the 40 Days of Lent become a Way of Life on Easter Monday?

Perhaps it is through these Small Successes garnered from several Internet sites...

> In reworking our failed New Year's Resolutions, we can fast by giving up snacks between meals, but we can also do a random act of kindness each day for someone we do not know.

> In Prayer, we can give up invoking God's name in anger, but we can also drive in silence long enough each day to pray a Rosary in the car.

> For those addicted to the Popular Culture, we can give up shows or videos with gratuitous sex or violence, but we can also download 15 minutes of Christian or sacred music to listen to each day.

> For Internet users or bloggers, we can limit our online time each day, but we can also subscribe to a prayer Podcast.

>For those who need to be more Grateful, we can avoid complaining about issues that only hurt our pride, but we can also start each day with the 'Heroic Minute' where we thank God for all our blessings.

>For those with lives Out of Balance, we can give up our most unhealthy habit, but we can walk for 15 minutes each day talking to Jesus.

>For those who need Spiritual Nourishment, we can give up video games, but we can also Google 'Catholic Saint of the Day' and read about their struggles in daily battles just like ours.

>For those who need to increase their Service to those in need, we can give up criticizing the people of the streets, but we can also give our specialty coffee money to the Poor Box for the St Vincent de Paul Society.

>For those who need to be more Active in our two Churches, we can give up leaving Mass early to avoid community interaction, but we can also volunteer once a month assisting in the ordinary tasks.

>And finally, just for Good Measure, we can cut in half the time between Confessions, carry snacks in our car to give to the people of the streets, and stop gossiping!



Sacred Conversations

Third Sunday of Lent

I hope that you had the great grace of being made to memorize the Ten Commandments as a child. But in case your brain has had to delete them to make room for the thousands of other things you've needed to stuff in there through the years, take the list out of today's first reading and see how long it takes to commit each one to memory again.

It was easier when we were kids. Our brains were more supple, of course, but, more than that, it was easy to confidently recite commandments we were certainly never going to break. I think of those commandments a lot these days, during tax time. It turns out that a lot of us are willing to break the seventh commandment because, well, we can.

Thou shalt not steal seems like such an obvious command. No society can prosper when there is no deterrence from stealing from each other. Certainly we can all point to government waste, and entitlements we deem immoral. Funding those in our taxes is a bitter pill. In other cases, though, hiding assets is meant to benefit the wealthier member of a divorcing couple, to the detriment of the children of that union.

These past two tax seasons have been particularly appalling as poor, single mothers realize that their "smart, savvy" ex has stolen their stimulus check from them. During the pandemic, the most obvious sin against the seventh commandment has been the number of fraudulent unemployment claims filed---sevenfold the number of authentic claims! Do we not realize that this is theft?

We need a "come to Jesus" moment. *Thou shalt not steal* is not a suggestion. It's an honest-to-God commandment.

Which commandment am I struggling with this Lent?





Saint of the Week

Saint Dominic Savio

So many holy persons seem to die young. Among them was Dominic Savio, the patron of choirboys.

Born into a peasant family at Riva, Italy, young Dominic joined Saint John Bosco as a student at the Oratory in Turin at the age of 12. He impressed Don Bosco with his desire to be a priest and to help him in his work with neglected boys. A peacemaker and an organizer, young Dominic founded a group he called the Company of the Immaculate Conception which, besides being devotional, aided John Bosco with the boys and with manual work. All the members save one, Dominic, would, in 1859, join Don Bosco in the beginnings of his Salesian congregation. By that time, Dominic had been called home to heaven.



As a youth, Dominic spent hours rapt in prayer. His raptures he called “my distractions.” Even in play, he said that at times, “It seems heaven is opening just above me. I am afraid I may say or do something that will make the other boys laugh.” Dominic would say, “I can’t do big things. But I want all I do, even the smallest thing, to be for the greater glory of God.”

Dominic’s health, always frail, led to lung problems and he was sent home to recuperate. As was the custom of the day, he was bled in the thought that this would help, but it only worsened his condition. He died on March 9, 1857, after receiving the Last Sacraments. Saint John Bosco himself wrote the account of his life.

Some thought that Dominic was too young to be considered a saint. Saint Pius X declared that just the opposite was true, and went ahead with his cause. Dominic was canonized in 1954. His liturgical feast is celebrated on March 9.

Like many a youngster, Dominic was painfully aware that he was different from his peers. He tried to keep his piety from his friends lest he have to endure their laughter. Even after his death, his youth marked him as a misfit among the saints and some argued that he was too young to be canonized. Pope Pius X wisely disagreed. For no one is too young—or too old or too anything else—to achieve the holiness to which we all are called.
